2013 Combined Federal Campaign kicks off

The 2013 Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) kick off was held in Letterkenny Army Depot's (LEAD) headquarters on October 7. Local non-profit organizations, the Cumberland Valley Animal Shelter and the Franklin County Shelter for the Homeless, were on site to share missions and their stories, encouraging employees to embrace this year's theme, "Serving Our Country, Serving Our Community."

As one of the largest employers in Franklin County, the CFC depends greatly on LEAD's participation and generosity. This year's goal is to raise \$70,000, benefiting not only local non-profit organizations, but national and international agencies as well.

It is no secret that the depot is still feeling the impact of sequestration and the recent furlough. But with that in mind, the depot must also appreciate the importance of supporting the CFC. Seeing firsthand that financial struggles can occur overnight and are often out

of one's control, brings LEAD employees closer to the realization that they too could potentially need to lean on the shoulder of its community in times of crisis.

As a cornerstone to Franklin County, it is LEAD's responsibility to pay it forward, giving as little or as much as it can to support these organizations. The depot supports its country everyday, now it is time to support its community.

Employees have the opportunity to view the CFC's comprehensive listing of charities on the LEAD portal or through booklets passed out by their organizations key person. Donors may specify the agency to receive contributions, so long as that agency is listed in the booklet. Each charity has participated in a rigorous process to earn the right to be included in the listing.

Please remember that donations can be paid at one time or through payroll deduction. These options give military, federal and



contract employees the opportunity to contribute. It is crucial for all envelopes be returned to their appropriate key person, even if no donation is made. All pledge forms must be accounted for.

Organizations around the depot will be hosting special events to raise money for their favorite charities. The Directorate of Information Management will hold weekly bake sales and tenant organization, Defense Intelligence Systems Agency will be holding a Turkey Trot walk/run on November 14. All proceeds will benefit the CFC.

Pennsylvania's lieutenant governor tours depot

Pennsylvania's Lieutenant Governor Jim Cawley visited Letterkenny Army Depot on Oct. 30 and toured the various maintenance facilities to experience the products, capabilities and accomplishments, firsthand.

"I am very favorably impressed by the way in which this facility, as well, doesn't rely on its 70 years of proud history, but it is preparing for the next 70 years," Cawley said. [They are] constantly re-tooling and constantly looking at ways they can do their jobs more efficiently and constantly preparing for what is next in the technological innovations of our military services."

As chairman of Gov. Tom Corbett's Pennsylvania Military Community Protection Commission, Cawley began a statewide tour of military installations to look at the role they play in providing national security and the economic impact to their local communities.

During the visit to Letterkenny, he was accompanied by other members of Corbett's Military Community Protection Commission including State Senator Richard Alloway II (R-33), Co-Chair of the Military Installation and Base Development Caucus.

"These are tough economic times all around, but we want to make sure that if DoD is looking to place missions around the country we want to put the best face forward for Letterkenny and show them what our workers can do here," said Alloway.

Raytheon awards LEAD for excellence

Letterkenny Army Depot recently received both the Superior Excellence Award and the Supplier Four Star Excellence Award for 2012 from its partner Raytheon. Raytheon chose LEAD as its supplier of the year for these reasons:

Letterkenny builds the guidance enhanced missile (GEM-T) (MIM-104E) for Raytheon. Their performance in 2012 has been critical to the success of key milestones in support of the GEM-T Missile contract for UAE.

Letterkenny built and sold 118 missile rounds in 2012 to meet two lot contractual deliveries four days ahead of Lot One due date and 11 days ahead of Lot Two due date despite continuously late contractor furnished material (CFM) shipments to Letterkenny. The depot supported all overtime requests (working 60-72 hours per week for approximately five months of the year) and even sent personnel to receive CFM shipments on off days.

Letterkenny also supported numerous rework requests to rework CFM per Raytheon direction throughout 2012, including six weeks of rework only (no production). They reduced capacity constraints by developing and upgrading production dollies and efficiently scheduling work to maximize throughput - without this, it would have been impossible to meet contractual deliveries.

Additionally, the depot built one OCONUS demonstration missile round eight months early to support customer requested schedule. Additionally, Letterkenny returned \$3 million in funds to support Raytheon 1Q2013 EACs resulting from exceptional program execution and performance in 2012.

Every day employees encounter hazards at the workplace that can be avoided. Letterkenny Army Depot (LEAD) has been awarded the Voluntary Protection Program (VPP) Star. Through hard work its employees have accomplished this important achievement through the help of every member of the workforce. It is beneficial to everyone to continue their safe work habits and to also look out for their coworkers.

VPP is a partnership with Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and is an employee based program. It encourages and recognizes excellence in safety and health. It is important to understand the requirements of the program and for all the employees at LEAD to continue to be actively involved in the safety and

health program.

It is concerning to see a co-worker not following proper safety procedures. What does one do if they have notified their supervisor and the safety hazard is not acknowledged and corrected? The answer is to continue to stay on top of the situation and to be responsible for the safety of oneself and fellow employees.

A perfect example of this would be a current employee, Anthony Ciata, who identified a hazard issue concerning a co-worker who was following the improper procedure. Ciata's co-worker was not wearing a hard hat at the appropriate times. Reaching out for help, he notified the safety office.

Safety Manager, Shea Hurley and Colonel Hagan came together and responded to this incident and ad-

ressed the issue of improper PPE equipment.

Ciata was awarded a Commander's Coin for recognizing this unsafe act. A four hour Safety Stand Down was conducted to address the issue.

It only takes one voice to be heard when it comes to safety in the workplace. Please take that extra effort by talking to the individual, designated supervisor, and by completing a Hazardous Reporting Process report to make sure they have been addressed.

With the effort of the whole depot, the LEAD workforce can continue to achieve VPP status and ensure everyone goes home safely to their families at the end of the day.

Safeguarding Personally Identifiable Information Q&A

Q: Whose responsibility is it to safeguard PII?

A: All users of Federal information and information systems

Q: What is PII?

A: Information that can be used to distinguish or trace someone's identity. Examples: SSN, age, civilian grade, home phone number, birthday, spouse's name.

Q: Is there a law that says we have to safeguard PII?

A: Yes, the Privacy Act of 1974 was signed into law in 1975

Q: What can happen to me if I don't safeguard PII?

A: It can result in criminal and civil penalties against you and your agency.

Q: What can happen to someone if their PII is revealed, lost, or stolen?

A: Identity theft, which can have personal and financial implications.

Q: How is PII usually compromised?

A: Usually through human error, not by external attacks. Examples: Phone rosters thrown in trash, SSNs left out on desks, emailing PII without encrypting.

Q: What is a PII breach?

A: PII that is lost, stolen, or sent to the wrong recipient. Call IA Office immediately if you suspect a PII breach. IA office must report it within one hour to R-Cert.

Q: What can I do to safeguard PII?

A: Shred documents instead of throwing them in the trash. Use PII cover sheets on documents that contain PII. Report PII that you see on Sharepoint or LEAD shared folders. Encrypt PII in emails and make sure you've chose correct recipient from Global address book. Never give out your PII unless the recipient has a need to know. Treat other people's PII as your own – safeguarding it.

Army Safe Autumn Campaign Now Available

With the passing of Labor Day, minds turn from the lazy days of summer to thoughts of football parties, hunting season and exercise in the great outdoors. Just like any other season, however, autumn can be a risky time of year.

To help Soldiers counter the hazards, the U.S. Army Combat Readiness/Safety Center recently released the annual Army Safe Autumn Campaign, a resource leaders and safety professionals may use to augment their existing risk management programs.

"This is many Soldiers' favorite time of year," said Brig. Gen. Timothy J. Edens, director of Army Safety and commanding general, USACR/Safety Center. "The kick-off of football and hunting seasons, combined with cooler weather, has a way of getting people outside."

Autumn is historically one of the Army's safer seasons, but of the accidents that do happen, most involve private motor vehicles.

"During the last several years, our Soldiers have shown they know how to stay safe," Edens said. "That's translated to fiscal 2013's double-digit reduction in PMV fatalities. As long as we're still losing Soldiers to these accidents, though, our work isn't done."

As of Aug. 22, Armywide fatalities in all PMVs, including sedans and motorcycles, were down 24 percent from fiscal 2012.

The Army Safe Autumn Campaign contains posters, feature articles, public service videos and resource documents leaders and safety professionals can use to populate their safety boards, build safety briefs and start a conversation with their Soldiers on risk management.

"We can't let our guard down just because the Army's doing well regarding accidents," said USACR/Safety Center Command Sgt. Maj. Richard D. Stidley. "We can all use a refresher on risk management basics. That's what these seasonally targeted campaigns do."

Prevent kitchen fires with LEAD's fire department

It is time for Fire Prevention Week, and from October 6-12, the Letterkenny Army Depot Fire Department is joining forces with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to remind depot employees to 'Prevent Kitchen Fires.' During this year's fire safety campaign, fire departments will be spreading the word about the dangers of kitchen fires, most of which result from unattended cooking, and teaching local residents how to prevent kitchen fires from starting in the first place.

According to the latest NFPA research, cooking is the leading cause of home fires. Two of every five home fires begin in the kitchen more than any other place in the home. Cooking fires are also the leading cause of home fire-related injuries.

Often when we are called to a fire that started in the kitchen, the residents tell us that they only left the kitchen for a few minutes. Sadly, that is all it takes for a dangerous fire to start. We hope that Fire Prevention Week will help us reach individuals in the community before they suffer from a damaging lesson.

Among the safety tips that firefighters and safety advocates will be emphasizing:

- *Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, broiling, or boiling food.*
- *If you must leave the room, even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.*
- *When you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, stay in the home, and use a timer to remind you.*
- *If you have young children, use the stove's back burners whenever possible. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.*
- *When you cook, wear clothing with tight-fitting sleeves.*
- *Keep potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels, and anything else that can burn, away from your stovetop.*
- *Clean up food and grease from burners and stovetops.*

If you have a fire in your oven keep the door closed, turn off the oven and call 911. If you have a fire in a pan on your stove top turn off the heat, smother the fire with a pan lid and call 911. Be very careful if you opt to use a fire extinguisher. The stored pressure in the extinguisher can spread a pan fire at close range. Never use flour or water on a stove top or oven fire. Flour is a dust that can explode and water will spread a grease fire. Many people have been seriously burned utilizing these tactics. Many "simple" fires have been spread to the entire kitchen by burning grease spattering from the application of water.

Fire Prevention Week is actively supported by fire departments across the country. Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health and safety observance on record.



Alloway Continues to Fight for Pennsylvania Military Installations

State Senator Richard Alloway, II, Co-Chair of the bipartisan, bi-cameral Military Installation and Base Development Caucus, joined other caucus leaders at Fort Indiantown Gap on September 17th for a meeting of the Pennsylvania Military Community Protection Commission.

The Commission came to being one year ago when Governor Tom Corbett signed an executive order creating the panel, which is focused on sustaining the value, the workforce and the economic impact of Pennsylvania's military installations.

Sen. John Blake (D-Lackawanna), Rep. Harry Readshaw (D-Allegheny) and Rep. Garth Everett (R-Lycoming) join Alloway (R-Franklin) as the General Assembly's representatives to the commission, which is chaired by Lieutenant Governor Jim Cawley.

"Pennsylvania's military installations are critical not only for the success of our armed services at home and abroad but also to the Commonwealth's economy. Our workforce is the best in the country and we as elected leaders need to do what we can to ensure that these jobs stay right here in Pennsylvania," Alloway said.

"Each of us came to this committee with a deeply sincere pledge to do what it takes to make sure Pennsylvania's military installations continue serving the United States of America in its ongoing commitment to defending freedom and liberty," Blake said. "We, in Harrisburg, need to maintain a very strong liaison with our Congressional delegation to protect Pennsylvania workers."

"Having spent over 20 years in the military and living in many communities in the United States and abroad, I have seen firsthand the impact that military installations have on the economy and makeup of the communities in which they are located. We owe it to our commonwealth communities to see that any actions taken do not alter their economic well-being or viability," Everett said.

"The greatest lesson we have learned is to honor our military and to maintain their presence and economic influence within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania while enduring cuts in the federal budget," Readshaw said. "We must be successful in realizing our goal."

While the commission conducted its first meeting on September 17th, members have been working behind the scenes to better understand the vital contributions each military base makes in the Pennsylvania communities they serve.

The commission provides recommendations to enhance the military value of all installations, organizations and defense-related regions of the commonwealth. It is also working to establish stronger relationships with Pennsylvania's Congressional delegation, and to provide quarterly reports on its activities to the governor.

The commission is also working to expand economic development opportunities for defense industry businesses that maintain a presence in Pennsylvania.

\$4,081.00 Given To Date In 1971 Fund Campaign

As the 1971 Chambersburg Area Combined Federal Campaign completed its second week last Friday, a total of \$4,081.00 has been contributed by military and civilian personnel of Letterkenny and other agencies located here. Altogether, 160 employees have contributed to the campaign with 103 taking out payroll deductions to make their contribution. This means that 64 percent of those contributing to the campaign to date have done so through payroll deductions.

It is hoped by Eugene Del Prete, campaign chairman, that this trend of personnel making their contributions through the payroll deduction plan will continue at this level or higher. Del Prete pointed out that last year payroll deductions amounted to approximately 69 percent of the total amount contributed in the campaign. It is only through this kind of an effort that the campaign will exceed last year's total of \$45,615.00.

The campaign will continue through November 13.

Del Prete emphasized — "We believe the most important thing of all is for everyone to give something, even if circumstances require that the amount be small. Of course, the more generous the gift, the better. And those that can afford to give substantially more should give accordingly. If every employee who ought to participate does so willingly and fairly the success of the 1971 Chambersburg Area Combined Federal Campaign will be assured."

Availability of Snow and Ice Melting Materials from the DPW

All supervisors and custodians of buildings need to take responsibility for areas in and around the entrances to your facilities. To assist you in that effort, ice melting materials and buckets should be at every pedestrian entrance into every facility. If you do not have a bucket, or your bucket is out of ice melting materials, or nearly out, submit a Directorate of Public Works (DPW) Service Order to have your bucket refilled.

Availability of Snow and Ice Removal Tools from DOPS:

To assist all depot organizations, including tenants, to prepare for the snow and ice removal season, the Directorate of Operations Planning, and Support (DOPS) has the following snow and ice removal equipment available for use.

DOPS has snow shovels and long handled ice chippers available to building custodians at the DOPS tool crib located in building 2270. The DOPS Tool Crib 3 is manned from 0600-1430 daily Monday-Friday. More information on obtaining snow shovels for obtaining a snow shovel and/or ice chipper:

a. Supervisors, Building Custodians or their representatives should contact Tool Crib 3 (DOPS) John Orsa, x7-8684, Building 2270 to sign for snow shovels and ice chippers.

b. Supervisors and custodians may return items to Tool Crib 3 Attendant, John Orsa, at the end of the snow season including broken ones for replacement, or they may keep them at their place of duty for the next snow and ice season.

c. Both ice chippers and snow shovels are highly pilferable items; therefore, all supervisors and custodians shall do everything they can to safe guard these against pilferage, so they are readily available for the next snow and ice storm.

Safety in and Around Snow Removal Equipment:

Extreme care must be taken by all employees both on and off depot when operating vehicles or while on foot in proximity to operating snow removal equipment. Here

are some safety tips when you come in contact with snow and ice removal equipment:

-Please give all snow removal equipment plenty of room to work. Operators of these pieces of equipment frequently have limited visibility particularly when backing, which they do frequently, and are concentrating on many aspects of their mission and may not necessarily see someone approaching close to their equipment.

-Make sure the equipment operator knows you are there. Everyone should give snow removal equipment a wide berth and only approach a vehicle if they have made eye contact with the operator and are sure the operator has seen them; and NEVER approach a piece of operating snow removal equipment from behind.

-Please try to park in lots that have been plowed and consolidate parking to allow the operators to continue to keep areas cleared without the possibility of striking vehicles or pedestrians going to or from their vehicles.

-Please do not place parts and materials in areas where it will be buried in snow and the operators will not be able to see them thus creating an unsafe condition and the possibility of damaging both the materials and the snow removal equipment.

If you have an area that is becoming unsafe due to snow or ice please call the DPW service order desk at x7-9010 during duty hours. During non-duty hours you can call the Construction and Maintenance Branch at x7-8442 or x7-8989 during snow removal emergencies.





Wontons with Sweet and Sour Sauce

Dipping Sauce Ingredients:

- 1 can pineapple tidbits
- ½ cup packed brown sugar
- 1 tbsp cornstarch
- 1/3 cup cider vinegar
- 1 tbsp soy sauce

Wonton Ingredients:

- ½ lb ground pork (Jimmy Dean)
- 2 cups finely shredded cabbage
- ¾ cup finely chopped bean sprouts
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 1 jumbo egg or two small eggs, beaten
- ¼ tsp pepper
- 2 packages wonton wrappers (12 oz each)
- Oil for frying (or Fry Daddy)



Drain pineapple, reserve juice. In saucepan, combine brown sugar, cornstarch and juice, vinegar, and soy sauce until smooth. Bring to boil, cook 2 minutes, reduce heat and add pineapple. Cover and simmer for 5 minutes. Reduce heat to warm.

In a separate pan, sauté pork (drain grease), then add cabbage, sprouts, and onion and sauté. Remove to bowl, cool. Add egg and stir. Moisten wonton wrapper edges with water. Add 1 tbsp of pork cabbage mix in center of wonton.

Fold wonton into triangle. Press edges down to seal mixture inside. Take 2 of the edges and pull together and pinch. Do this for each wonton until mixture is gone. Heat oil to 375 degrees; fry several wontons at a time for 2 ½ minutes, turning once. Drain on paper towels.

- 1 small onion, chopped fine




